Opinions on Technology Industry Regulation

— SEPTEMBER 2024



Methodology

This poll was conducted between September 6th – 9th, 2024, on behalf of the Computer and Communications Industry Association, among 2,500 registered voters. The interviews were conducted online, and the data was weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on age, gender, race, educational attainment, 2020 presidential vote, and region.

Results from the full survey have a margin of error of +/- 2 percentage points depending on demographic group.

Key Takeaways

1 **Leading American technology companies have a positive impact on the world.**

Voters agree that leading American technology companies have a positive impact on their communities and recognize the impact they have on the economy, innovation, and the U.S.'s standing on the global stage.

2 **Technology industry regulation is not a priority for voters.**

Voters make it clear that there are other top priorities for Congress to address, like the economy, healthcare, and crime, and not regulation of the technology industry.

3 **Breaking up technology companies is not an important outcome of regulation for voters.**

Only one-in-ten voters identified breaking up technology companies as the most important outcome of regulating technology companies and very few even trust the federal government to determine regulations.

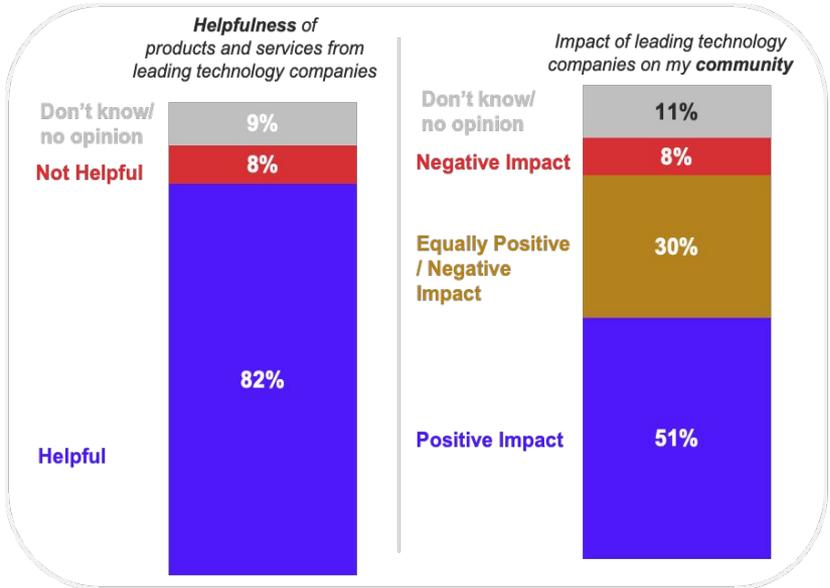
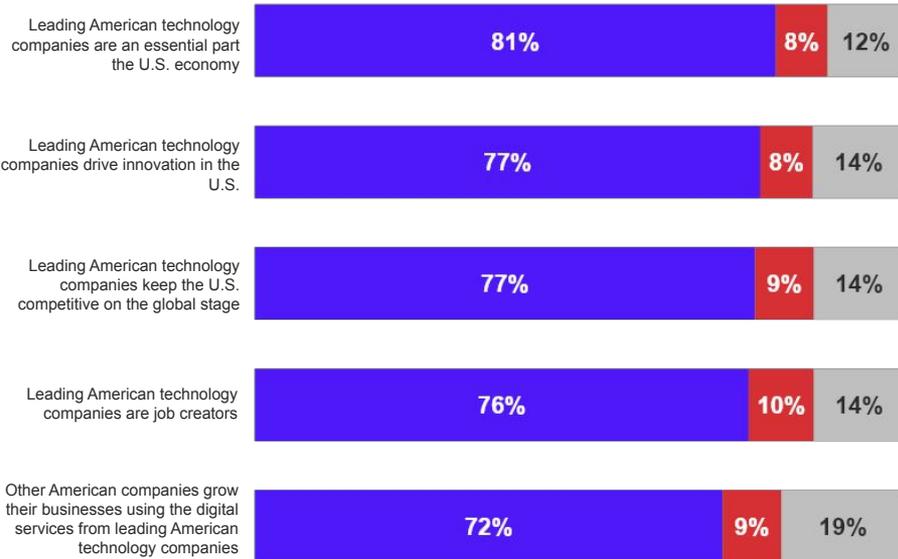
4 **Government action against technology companies will have an electoral impact.**

Half of voters, including both Democrats and Republicans, are less likely to vote for their members of Congress if they support government action that threatens widely used digital tools.
